An unlicensed contractor working on your property could make you liable if any employees or subcontractors are injured.



Steps to Home Improvement Success



Verify the Contractor's License

As you're researching contractors and obtaining bids, be sure to check if the contractor is licensed. You can do this for free at dopl.utah.gov.

Prepare Plans

Prepare detailed building plans to ensure end product complies with state building codes and meets your expectations. This process is typically completed by an architect or interior designer. Depending on the project, plans

Depending on the project, p may take weeks to years to complete.



Get Several Bids

Research local contractors and contact 2-3 to obtain bids for your project. After obtaining these bids, always check a minimum of three references for each contractor before choosing who to hire.



Get it in Writing

No matter the size of the project, it is important to put it in a written contract. This contract should include the exact work to be done, the contract price, the project beginning and ending dates, permit procurement, and a guarantee of liability coverage.

Money Down & Payments

Be cautious of requests for large down payments. Payments should be made as work is completed. Never pay in cash.

Monitor Progress

Check in with the contractor regularly on the progress of the job, including whether the contractor has obtained all required building permits. These permits should be provided or displayed on the job site.

Before Final Payment

Before submitting a final payment, make sure your contractor has obtained **signed** lien releases from all suppliers and sub-contractors. You can see the status of liens on your home by visiting the State Construction Registery at SCR.utah.gov.
